Industrial Visit cum Workshop at Lenit Pharmaceuticals, Raja ka Bagh: On April 10, 2024, B.Sc. second-year students from Government Arya

Degree College, Nurpur, were given an industrial visit by the Department of Chemistry and the Institution Incubation Center to Lenit Pharmaceuticals Raja ka Bagh. The workshop/visit was led by Mr. Dinesh Gupta, the Chairman and Managing Director of Lenit Pharmaceuticals. Industry executives gave the students a detailed demonstration of their manufacturing, packing, and quality control procedures. The many processes and tools used in drug manufacture, including the mass mixer, multi mill, dryer, compression, and drug coating, were taught to the students. Industry leaders demonstrated the packaging process using a double track blister packing system, a strip packing system, and an Alu-Alu machine. They also thoroughly described the many types of packing, such as blister packing, strip packing, and Alu-Alu packing. > Computer Basics Course: Forty-five students finished the 30-hour computer training course "Computer Basics." The goal of this program is to give students the foundational computer skills they need to succeed in school, the job, and daily life. 
